



Friday, May 5 at 12:00. Landmarks' Office (911 Washington Avenue, Suite 170). Brown Bag Lecture: The Lodge That Levis Built– Architect Preston J. Bradshaw's Vision for a Magnate.

Perched high atop the bluffs of the Mississippi River, north of Alton, is a remarkable little structure referred to as “the Tea House” by locals and “the Lodge” by its architect, Preston J. Bradshaw. Bradshaw designed the Lodge for Charles Levis of Owens-Illinois Glass Company in 1934. The Lodge shares many characteristics with buildings designed by Bernard Maybeck for Principia College. St. Louis architect John Guenther, FAIA, LEED AP, who has designed and planned various buildings on the campus of Principia since 1995, will discuss the architectural design, materials, colors, and textures of this bluff-top pavilion

just visible from the River Road. No reservations required. Free. Open to public - bring your lunch.

Saturday, May 6 at 2:00. Tour the St. Louis Armory building (3676 Market Street) and learn about plans for a planned 43 million dollar redevelopment by Green Street.



- Completed in 1937 as the home of the 138th Infantry, the building has served many different purposes since the military left in the 1950s. Before it went vacant, the armory served as a concert venue and an indoor tennis facility where Arthur Ashe and Jimmy Connors trained. Come see this amazing building and hear about how it will be once again repurposed and put back into productive use.

All tour participants should wear outdoor clothing and sturdy shoes. Flashlights are recommended. Meet on east side of building. Reservations required. Cost is \$20 for Landmarks Members, \$30 for non-members.

Sunday May 7, 10:30-12:00. Join Landmarks Association and Tom Nagel of City Arch River on a tour of the new construction on the grounds of the St. Louis Arch.

Discover the new construction and renovation occurring in the park surrounding the Gateway Arch, Kiener Plaza, and the riverfront.

This tour requires a substantial amount of walking. Tour begins at the east steps of the Old Court House. Reservations required. \$5.00 for members, \$10.00 non-members.

Wednesday, May 10 at 12:00. Landmarks' Office (911 Washington Avenue, Suite 170). Brown Bag Lecture: The Lost City Found; French Colonial Archaeology beneath the Poplar Street Bridge.

Michael Meyer, Principal Investigator, MO Department of Transportation Archaeology Program



Michael will discuss the status of MoDOT's multi-year excavation of perhaps the oldest traces of St. Louis city, located below the Poplar Street Bridge and south of the Gateway Arch. Through careful excavation, archaeologists have uncovered remains of six colonial French properties, including most recently a 1760s house built by a fur trader and later used by a blacksmith. Information that is being gathered today through excavation is already changing our understanding of the history of St. Louis and of the region in general. No reservations required. Free. Open to public.

Saturday May 13 at 11:00. Tour the former Lafayette School in Soulard (815 Ann) and see the ongoing progress of the Dr. Arzt House (2322 S. 12th St).

See the recent transformation of William Ittner's Lafayette School (1906) which sat vacant from 2004, when the school closed, to the fall of 2016, when it opened as apartments. We will then tour the charming Second Empire home built by Dr. Franz Arzt. The Arzt home has been undergoing an extensive




rehabilitation since 2015. Come see the painstaking work in restoring all the details. Tour meets at 11:00 at Lafayette School and then moves to Arzt House around 11:45. Reservations required. Cost is \$10 for Landmarks' members, \$15 for non-members. * The owner of the Arzt house has requested that participants sign a liability waiver for visiting this active construction site.



Thursday, May 18, 5:30-6:30: 3700 Forest Park Avenue. Tour the former Federal Mogul factory and learn about the exciting redevelopment plans.

Slated to become a destination food court, retail and office venue, the redevelopment will build on the momentum of nearby assets like Cortex. When the Lawrence Group is finished, the old factory will be “The City Foundry, St. Louis” and those who see it in its current state won’t believe their eyes.

Participants should wear outdoor clothing and sturdy shoes. Hard hats (provided) are required. Reservations Required. \$10 for Landmarks’ members, \$15 for non-members.



Saturday May 20, 11:00-12:00: Visit the ongoing rehabilitation of the St. Louis Soldiers’ Memorial and hear about the vision for the finished product from project architect Erik Biggs (Mackey-Mitchell).



The Depression Era memorial is undergoing an extensive renovation and will reopen under the leadership of the MO History Museum in 2018.

Due to current conditions, participants will not be able to access the interior of the building, but this remains a great opportunity to hear about the effort to bring the building back to life from someone who has been involved every step of the way. Reservations required, but the tour is free

and open to the public.

Tuesday, May 23, 5:30-7:00. Visit the newly rehabilitated stock house of the Cherokee Brewery (2724 Cherokee Street); learn about the building’s new use as the home of Earthbound Brewing, and get a behind the scenes tour of the former lagering cellars.



Until recently, these cellars, which date in part to the 1860s, had been filled with debris from the demolition of the rest of the brewery. After painstaking excavation and restoration over the course of the last year, significant portions of the cellars are now accessible and once again being used to brew and store beer. Come hear about the excavation process and Earthbound Brewery’s plans, and enjoy a complimentary pint during happy hour in the tasting room.
